After months of legal wrangling, the High Court in London ruled that Philip Green, the ex. owner of BHS, could be named as the originator of NDA's that bound staff to silence about incidents of abuse involving the powerful business owner in return for receiving large sums of money. The incidents involved touching female members of staff inappropriately and suggesting a senior black employee was still 'throwing spears in the jungle.'

An NDA, which is an abbreviation for non-disclosure agreement, is a legal agreement originally designed to prevent the leak of sensitive

company information. They are usually effective for a period of 2-5 years. Increasingly, however, their use is being questioned as high profile individuals use them to protect themselves from damaging revelations in the media about their misdemeanours.


